SHOOT A VIDEO

Use a creative video format, considering ideas like the examples below.

- ❑ Create a narrated tour around places in your community that represent the ideas you are trying to get across in your project. These places could involve a focus on places that represent such examples as food access and availability, food labelling, sustainability practices, technology, evidence of the impact of climate variability or waste.
- ❑ Build an explainer video that explains a proposal you are presenting, busts a food or farming myth or profiles a farmer or agricultural community. Make sure that you provide explanations, details, examples and reasons in the narration of your explainer video.
- ❑ Tell a story about a local or global food policy issue or strategy, a food and farming myth or of a farmer or farming community. Plan your story in an agricultural setting, involve farm characters and build a plot.
- ❑ Do video interviews that explore perspectives and experiences of farmers, consumers and community members connected to your project focus.
- ❑ Use a documentary format to present your project. Watch food and farming documentaries to get some ideas for planning and presenting your topic. Build your documentary around a strong and clear message.
- ❑ Storyboard the script for the video. Think about props that you may need. Plan how you will film. Use a template to view the area you will film as you practice.
- ❑ Upload your video to a **Google Drive**, **YouTube** or **Vimeo** or other platform to submit your project with the video URL.

OR USE YOUR OWN IDEA

Develop your own project format. You may decide you'd rather do an essay, a comic book or strip, a graphic novel or a poster. You may have your own ideas. Get the go-ahead from your teacher before you start.
