Food Systems, Past and Present

Food systems have always existed. However, people's activities, practices and processes associated with each step in the system have changed over time.




Food and Farming Challenges

Consider the food and farming challenges identified in the infographic below. This infographic describes areas of concern related to Canada's food system and comes from research conducted by the Canadian Centre for Food Integrity in 2019. People who participated in this CCFI survey were asked to rate their level of concern on these issues.

The numbers in the infographic show the percentage of people who said that they strongly agreed that the issue was an area of concern.

The Canadian Centre for Food Integrity identified some similar areas of concern in their 2021 study. The top three "life" issues identified by Canadians were also associated with the food system. They included the rising cost of food, keeping healthy food affordable and climate change.



How do you and your community rate issues such as those identified by the CCFI in 2019 and 2021? Select at least **three** of these issues. Create a survey that measures the level of concern for each of these issues. Use a five-point scale, such as:

- 1. Strongly concerned
- 2. Somewhat concerned
- 3. Not sure
- 4. A bit concerned
- 5. Not that concerned

Collect surveys from three or four people. Combine your survey results with those of your classmates.

As a small group or class, decide how you will represent your survey results. A graph? An infographic? A chart? Use your survey results to discuss the following questions.

Which issues were of most concern in your community? Why do you think these issues are important to people in your community?	
Which issues were of least concern in your community? Why do you think these issues are not as important to people in your community?	
Based on the results of your survey, what are two changes you would like to make to the food system? Why would you make these changes? Revisit the food system image to help you think about your recommendations.	As a group, you may decide to share your results and conclusions with the people who participated in your survey.
